

Their capital credits check was returned last year — address unknown. If you know the current location for any of these former members, please have them call or e-mail the appropriate cooperative with their new address and/or phone number. We'll then mail their capital credits check. In addition, BCREA's list also includes older, uncashed accounts payable checks. More names are listed this year as two



wholesale power suppliers retired capital credits. Great River Energy paid out capital credits, plus Southern Minnesota Energy Cooperative retired funds.

If we do not receive new addresses on these missing members, their unclaimed capital credits checks are donated to a tax-exempt organization. Brown County Rural Electrical Association and Federated Rural Electric donate unclaimed capital credits to their

Operation Round Up programs. Brown County REA's Round Up Trust donates to charitable organizations, individuals and families in crisis and scholarships in the co-op service area. Federated's Round Up Trust Board awards nine high school scholarships and awards the rest to other Operation Round Up recipients.

Be on the lookout for the 2022 Brown County REA Annual Report



A copy of the Brown County REA 2022 Annual Report will arrive in members' mailboxes by mid-March. Included in this year's report is a proposed amendment to the cooperative bylaws which removes the

requirement for members to send a written request, at least 20 days prior to the Annual Meeting, to receive a mail ballot. This change would allow the cooperative to send a mail ballot to all members prior to the Annual Meeting.

For the 2023 Annual Meeting, a written ballot request is

required. A request form is included in the annual report. To receive a mail ballot, the request form must be completed and returned to the cooperative by March 24, 2023. Mail ballots will be sent to those from whom a request is received and must be returned by 4 p.m. April 13, 2023. Also included with the annual report mailing is a proxy vote form. A spouse not listed as the cooperative member who plans to attend the Annual Meeting and vote by proxy will need to bring along the completed form.



Grassroots efforts helped modify energy bill

At Minnesota's electric cooperatives, our priority is to provide sustainable, reliable and affordable electricity. With that goal in mind, I want to provide an update on a piece of significant legislation that the governor recently signed.

That legislation calls for Minnesota's electric sector to be 100-percent carbon free by 2040. While Minnesota's rural electric

cooperatives had significant reservations with the original bill, we are pleased to report that the final package is better than what was first proposed, despite our continued concerns about affordability and reliability.

Our grassroots' efforts were successful in getting legislators from both sides of the aisle to work with us to add amendments that addressed some of our major concerns. Thank you to everyone who reached out to your legislators and made your voice heard. It made a difference.

Minnesota's electric cooperatives have long been working and planning toward a sustainable, reliable and affordable energy future. We want you, our member-owners, to know that the heat will be on in the dead of winter and the AC available in the dog days of summer. Furthermore, we want the electricity we provide to always be affordable for your family, while being good stewards of our planet.

The Minnesota Rural Electric Association successfully secured changes to the legislation that will provide more flexibility in implementing its mandates. As one example, we sought and obtained language providing greater flexibility in the use of renewable energy credits (RECs) as an option to comply with the carbon reduction mandates. We also received a reduction in the steep timeline, allowing co-ops to reach 60 percent carbon-free generation by 2030, rather than 80 percent at that time. All utilities still need to be 100-percent carbon free by 2040. However, the

legislation contains "off-ramps" that allow utilities to ask the Public Utilities Commission to modify the legislation's requirements if needed to protect reliability or affordability.

Minnesota's rural electric co-ops advocated for other adjustments to improve reliability and affordability that did not make it into the final bill; yet, we remain hopeful that additional concerns can be addressed in the future.

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Federated directors met with Minnesota Representatives Bjorn Olson and Marj Fogelman February 21. Directors in the back row are Darvin Voss, David Meschke, David A. Hansen, Bruce Brockmann and Scott Thiesse. Topics of discussion included the 100-percent carbon free mandate, opposing mandates on electric cooperatives and defending the rural electrification tax exemption.



Brown County REA directors also met with their legislators February 21. Director Brad Sprenger, Comfrey, discussed proposed legislation with Representative Paul Torkelson. Topics covered included the radio control receivers avoiding unnecessary state requirements and matching state funds to unlock federal infrastructure funding.

We want you to know that your electric cooperatives are working to provide an environmentally-friendly energy future, while keeping the reliability and affordability you expect. We ask that you stay engaged as more legislation moves through the process and sign up for alerts at https:// voicesforcooperativepower.com/minnesota/.

Swedish Meatballs

by Jan Knips, Lakefield 2 lb. ground beef

- 1 small onion, chopped fine ³/₄ c. milk
- ³/₄ c. uncooked quick oatmeal 1 egg
- salt & pepper to taste
- 2 cans golden mushroom soup 1 soup can of milk

Mix the beef, onion, milk, oatmeal, egg and seasonings. Form into walnutsized balls. Place into a greased 9x13" pan. Combine the soup and milk in a bowl. Pour over meatballs.

Bake uncovered at 350° for one hour or until the meat is no longer pink.
